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In the Park...



My last article focused on the migratory ducks that wintered at French Lake this year. Surprisingly, a pair of Canada geese (I just learned that "Canadian goose" is incorrect; at least I'm learning something from my writing!) appeared in May and stayed around several days before resuming their journey northward. Nearly all of the migratory ducks had departed for their northern homes before the Canada geese's short layover.

With their departure, the duck population has dropped by two-thirds from the winter's high population count.

A vigorous mating season in April and May — and if you've seen ducks mate, you know it is always "vigorous" — has given us cause to hope that the recent downward trend in our year-round duck population may have begun to reverse. Several broods of ducklings have appeared, and their survival rate is noticeably higher than in the recent past. For example, one mother still has 10 of her 12 ducklings after three weeks; another, four of her seven after a month and a half.

Part of this success is due to our own goose, Sarge. As in prior years, Sarge has adopted a brood and their mother, and we have seen kids and teenagers on several occasions learn not to approach ducklings guarded by Sarge!

A higher survival success corresponds with less coyote activity. However, I found one coyote kill at the lake a few days ago. My wife dislikes my getting up onto my anti-urban coyote soapbox, and I dislike bringing up the subject of politics, but I am holding out some hope that our new District 6 council member, whoever it is, will possess the common sense to encourage the City to reconsider its present ill-considered policy regarding urban coyotes —"We will do nothing until someone gets hurt." I, for one, will encourage the new council member to consult with officials of other cities about the (lack of) wisdom of such a policy, starting with Frisco, Arlington, and Dallas where children have been killed and injured by coyotes that have lost their fear of humans.

With the weather warming and with females on nests, many of our permanent duck residents are wandering out of the park and into the neighborhood. Please remember to drive carefully, keeping an eye out for ducks in the alleys and on the roads, sometimes several blocks away from the lake or the creek.

Egret Preparation and Awareness

Egrets have established a rookery north of Altamesa and west of Hulen in the circle of Sabrosa Court West. The picture to the right is from May 8th and shows the large quantity of egrets in these three trees. There are other homes in this cul-de-sac that also have egrets in their trees, yards, and pool.

Fort Worth (FW) Animal Control (AC) was granted "takes" from the Federal Game Warden to remove egret/heron eggs from FW trees. ("Takes" is the name given for official permits to remove eggs.) FWAC worked with the homeowner and homeowner's tree service to remove hundreds of eggs from nests as well as the empty nests. Unfortunately, AC did not have sufficient takes to remove all of the eggs from the nests on Sabrosa Court.



There are no other rookeries in our area (Candleridge or Wedgwood South). These birds find comfort in a rookery, tend to support one another when they are threatened by predators, and are unlikely to nest in a new place since Animal Control was unable to remove all the eggs.

In March and April this year, we ran off several herons from Candleridge homeowner trees prior to nesting. Additionally, I have received a few calls to come and checkout concerned homeowner sightings.

Please remember the following:

November-March—Trim trees. <u>I did not see many trees being trimmed this year.</u>

January-February—Blue Herons or Yellow Crowned Night Herons arrive as Scouts.

March-April—Herons nest and establish rookeries from March thru April. <u>I was notified of the rookery on Sabrosa on April 17</u>. Had AC been notified earlier, it could have helped.

April-May—Eggs are laid.

April-October—Rookeries with hatchlings and fledglings become fully established.

September-October—Egrets and herons leave.

October-January—Residents clean up trees and remove any nests.

NOTE: Nests can only be removed if they do not contain eggs

Candleridge Garden Club



Thank You Citizens on Patrol Volunteers

Citizens on Patrol was started in October of 1991 with only 105 volunteers. Today there are over 1,000 patrollers in Fort Worth. This all-volunteer unit was started in eleven neighborhoods and has expanded into nearly every sub-division and neighborhood in Fort Worth.

Citizens on Patrol's purpose is to project an image of security in each neighborhood by having patrols at various days of the week and at various times of the day in the volunteer's car or truck with Citizens on Patrol signs displayed on the vehicle. This presence let's a prospective criminal know we are watching in this neighborhood and, hopefully, they will move on and leave the area. Members can patrol while walking or while riding bicycles or motorcycles. If a COP member sees a crime in progress, the member is to call it in to 911 or on a city provided 2 way radio which is monitored at all times by a base station operator. COP members do not personally confront a would be suspect.



Ground rules do not allow COPs Patrollers to make contact with a prospective criminal, only to observe and call in the suspicious behavior observed. We are not allowed to put ourselves in harms way, and we are not allowed to carry firearms while patrolling. We are required to patrol a minimum of four hours per month, but you can patrol as many hours as desired. Patrollers do get a \$25.00 reimbursement gift card for every 25 hours of patrolling to help with the cost of gas.

I have been a Citizen Patroller for 5 years, and it is something that each of us needs to consider becoming a part of. Currently, we have 7 patrollers for CandleRidge. With crime everywhere all around us, we need more patrollers and for all of the residents to always be watchful and aware of suspicious activity and to not be inattentive to the crime wave that is currently striking all communities. Visibility of these COP vehicles with COP signs on them truly makes a criminal think twice. It is important for CandleRidge that we all project an image of readiness and security towards prospective criminals.

On May 13, The City of Fort Worth swore in nine Council members who won re-election and one new Council member in District 5. The swearing in took place in the new Council Chambers with many of the family members and supporters present. Absent from the proceedings was a new District 6 Council member, an official who was still yet to be determined because neither of the candidates received 50% of the votes. In a runoff to represent District 6, which includes the CandleRidge neighborhood, were Mia Hall and Daryl Davis II. Mia Hall won the election, and your board looks forward to working with her.

Candleridge residents may also be interested in the upcoming 2026 bond election. The city has presented a draft of possible projects for voter consideration. The currently proposed plan includes five areas of improvements that total \$800 million. These include streets and mobility, parks and open space, public libraries, public safety, and animal care and shelter facilities. Projects totaling \$72.6 million are proposed for District 6 and include some projects that span into other council districts. This is more than triple the 2022 amount of \$23.7 million. The public engagement process will be taking place this summer and continue through the fall, though no public meetings are currently scheduled. Stay informed and keep an eye out on the city's website for more information on how to get involved with the 2026 Bond Program! The City's website is www.fortworthtexas.gov.
